Josep Maria Palet (ICAC) Santiago Riera Mora (SERP-UB) European high mountain areas are currently of prime importance in the management and definition of continental landscapes. From 1980 onwards, different research projects have depicted European mountain regions as ancient human-shaped landscapes, revealing and stressing the value of their cultural heritage. As a result, European mountain spaces are currently acknowledged as genuine Cultural Landscapes.

Many European research projects have been set up to account for the anthropisation history of mountain spaces. In parallel, different research networks have originated to strength the contact within different research teams studying Mountain Landscapes.

In this context, the Catalan Institute of Classical Archaeology (ICAC), in coordination with SERP (University of Barcelona) and GEODE (University of Toulouse), is organizing an International Workshop on the archaeological research of mountain cultural landscapes following a long-time and interdisciplinary perspective.

This Workshop aims to be a meeting point where different researchers working on Landscape Archaeology of mountain areas can discuss and exchange methodologies, experiences and the results of their ongoing research programs.

Following, a second Workshop will be organized in September 2009 by the GEODE (University of Toulouse). This meeting will focus on the discussion and comparison of results to elucidate regional landscape strategies in the management of mountain landscapes.

This Workshop is not intended to be a mere presentation of specific results but an analysis of current programs, strategic methodologies and future research approaches.

Communications are estimated to take between 15 and 20 minutes. English will be the preferred language of the workshop. If necessary, French can also be used during the presentations.

Attendance to the workshop is free for the 1st and 2nd session (4th and 5th), while the 3rd session (6th) is thought to be a discussion day for the Workshop' speakers.
